# Village Hall Comments

# The Blackout and RVC's Energy Future



of August 14 was a sobering experience. We realized, again, how dependent we are on the technology and electrical devices we use each day. We came through

the experience well — never totally losing power. That was due to the foresight of earlier Village officials and residents, and today's skilled Village management — particularly the team at the Electric Department headed up by the Superintendent, Paul J. Pallas, and the Deputy Superintendent, Tom Cardile.

I personally got to watch the Electric Department in action that day. When I arrived at the plant, almost everyone was in the Control Room working to monitor and adjust the load. Some of the men stood in front of panels indicating distribution to different parts of the Village. The atmosphere was tense but professional.

Moments later the Number 7 engine exploded and went out of service. Everyone continued at their station, adjusting to each change in the power supply and the demand for electrical service. I have great admiration for the manner in which our Electric Department team performed and I am very proud of them and grateful to be a Rockville Centre resident.

There are a few things about how our Electric Department managed during the blackout that I would like to share with you.

First, we never totally shut down. When the power went out, we were still generating approximately 20 percent of our load with three engines. Once things stabilized, 70 percent of the Village could be provided with power at a time. This led to the rolling blackouts most of us experienced.

Obviously, decisions had to be made — based on the critical nature of some facilities and the way our distribution system is configured — as to

whose lights stayed on and whose did not.

Perhaps you wonder what a critical facility is. South Nassau Communities Hospital is one, as are our water and sewer pumps. The blood bank is another.

Early on, the decision was made that our downtown should be kept running. This gave people a place to go for a meal or a movie — with air conditioning, on a very hot evening. Rockville Centre was the only place you could buy gas for miles around.

The system of four hours on and four hours off that residents experienced was based on the fact that food will keep in a closed refrigerator for up to eight hours. Four hours meant we could all open the refrigerator occasionally. It also gave the Electric Department time to manage the load, distributing power to more residents on a gradual basis.

But what about the future?

As most residents are aware, it is less expensive to import power than to generate it at our electric plant. That is why, during the last year, a third transmission line (the Bellmore line) was added. This year we will seek permission from the Public Service Commission to build a new substation.

Rockville Centre's load growth (need for more power) hovers at about 1 percent per year. However, we are currently required by the NYS Independent System Operator (ISO) to purchase excess capacity as a reserve margin. This has cost the Village approximately \$40,000 per month this year. Therefore, the Board of Trustees anticipates that at some point in the future we will be asking the Public Service Commission for permission to add some new generating capacity. This will help us to meet demand and help to satisfy the ISO requirements.

Our electric plant is a unique part of what makes Rockville Centre a great place to live. Be assured that The Board of Trustees is following in the tradition of earlier village boards by actively working to see that Rockville Centre's electric plant is modernized and upgraded for the future in a cost effective manner.
