Nursery School Art Show

Summer Playground Program

Village Elections June 21

Village residents will go to the polls on Tuesday, June 21 from 7 A.M. to 9 P.M. at 10 different locations to elect two trustees and a Village justice, all to four-year terms. Residents will also be asked to approve a referendum allowing an increase in the Fire Service Awards (see Page 4).

Any Village resident who is registered to vote in Nassau County

may vote in the Village election. Unregistered newcomers, those who have changed addresses since last November, and new voters must register with the County Board of Elections by June 10 in order to be eligible to vote in this election.

Residents planning to vote by absentee ballot must make the application at Village Hall no later than June 14.

Arbor Day in Tree City



The RVC Association of Girl Scouts organized its annual Arbor Day tree planting on the Village Green in May. Trustees Greg Rinn and Mary Bossart and Mayor Eugene Murray joined the scouts and their leader Jackie Stetson to plant a Little Leaf Linden near the 9/11 Memorial. The Village's tree planting and replacement program is one of the reasons it was recently named a Tree City USA for the 16th consecutive year by the National Arbor Day Foundation. Since 1986, more than 3,200 trees have been planted in the Village as part of its residential tree-planting program, in addition to the many trees planted on Village property and in commercial areas by the Village.

Fire Service Award Referendum

On June 21, voters will be asked to approve a referendum increasing the amount of the Fire Service Award contribution for qualifying volunteer firefighters beginning in 2006 from \$480 per year to \$700, the new limit allowed by the state.

Based on the current number of qualifying volunteers, the total cost of the program would rise to about \$135,000 per year. The program provides a pension contribution for volunteers whose level of activity during the year qualifies them to receive the award.

Frank E. Yannelli has been a practicing attorney since 1964 and has served as Village Justice since 1983. Before becoming Village Justice, he was a prosecutor in the Village Court. His community activities included membership on the Board of Directors of the RVC Economic Opportunity Council (EOC) and on the Zoning Board of Appeals. He also serves the community as a member of the Board of Directors of Confide and of the RVC Education Foundation. He is a former soccer coach.

He is a past President of the Nassau County Bar Association, the Nassau County Magistrates Association, and the Criminal Court's Bar Association. He is recipient of awards from the Nassau County Court Officers Benevolent Association, the Criminal Court's Bar Association, the Nassau County Bar Association, and the Catholic Lawyers Guild.

He was admitted to the Bar in New York State and to practice in the United States Southern and Eastern District Courts, the United States Circuit Court of Appeals, and the United States Supreme Court. He has lectured on the law to many organizations, including the New York Bar Association, and to schools.

He graduated from Georgetown University with a B.S. degree. He received his M.A. and J.D. from Fordham University. He is a veteran of the United States Army.

He and his wife reside in Rockville Centre where she is a teacher. They are the parents of three adult sons: Christopher, Michael, and Thomas.

Andrew P. Karamouzis of Wright Road is a commercial litigation partner in the Rockville Centre office of Moran & d'Arcambal. He earned a B.A. in history from the University of Pennsylvania and a J.D. from Fordham University School of Law where he was a member of the Law Review. Andrew began his legal career in the litigation department of the nationally recognized law firm of Shearman & Sterling where he worked from 1989 to 1995.

Edward J. Oppenheimer, a life-long Rockville Centre resident, is a local certified public accountant and member of the New York State Society of CPAs. He is currently serving the Village on the Planning Board and is an active, 26-year firefighter and emergency medical technician with Floodlight Company of the Rockville Centre Fire Department. Ed is a long-time member of the Citizens' Finance Committee, which consults with the Mayor and Village Board regarding the annual Village budget. He also volunteers his time with the Village Parking and Transportation Committee.

Mr. Oppenheimer was elected to the first Nassau County Legislature to represent Rockville Centre. He also was elected to serve as a trustee and president of the RVC Public Library and as a trustee and treasurer of the Nassau County Library System. He is a member of the Board of Directors of the RVC Chamber of Commerce and treasurer of the Rockville Centre Community Fund and was treasurer of the We Care 9-11 Fund.
