Praise for a Dedicated Staff

n the three years I have been a trustee, I have found much to celebrate about how our Village works, and how those who work for the Village provide much value. Over these last years, in this space and at Board meetings, I have been happy to highlight these real accomplishments, extolling how our Village managers, employees and

our volunteers, do everything from putting themselves in harm's way to picking up every item, no matter how bulky, that we put out on our curbs.

Residents are truly grateful for the dedication and accomplishments from all these Village departments: fire and police, public works, water, electric and engineering. And, since the appointment of our new building superintendent, Daniel Casella — who was just recently sworn in as the President of the New York State Building Officials Conference — I have heard much positive feedback about the improvements in the Building Department.

In addition, we have other Village departments that are truly "people service" departments: our Department of Senior Services, our Parks and Recreation Department, and our Martin Luther King, Jr. Community Center. Our residents should know that Senior Services and Parks and Recreation have been led for decades by two of the most talented people in their field. Thanks to Dr. Cyd Charrow of Senior Services and Tony Brunetta of Parks and Recreation, these departments have become the gold standard. And these three departments are consistently magnets for county, state, and federal grant funding.

Over the years that I have been a trustee, I have seen literally hundreds of thousands of dollars flow to our Village in the form of grant funding from our elected state representatives, Senator Skelos and Assemblyman Barra, and also from County

In the past year, the Village was able to make critical and much needed repairs at the MLK Center through such grants and the recent appointment of Robert A.U. Hogan as MLK director, bodes well for further improvements. My first two years, I was happy to be Board liaison to the Senior Center, the MLK Center and the Community Development Block Grant Committee, and saw firsthand what great work these employees, and volunteers, accomplish in our community.

I have been privileged to be the Board liaison to the Parks and Recreation Department, which is a jewel in the crown of what makes Rockville Centre great. Much of the credit for this goes to our own "Mr. B," Superintendent Tony Brunetta, whose literal 24/7 approach to the job, and his genius for selecting and nurturing talented staff, makes our parks and the Recreation Center a beacon for families in our community.

Seeing is believing: on what was just a regular day this past summer, Mr. B could be seen at 9 A.M. greeting parents and children on entry into the Rec Center summer playground program; at mid-day, checking on some of our far-flung playing fields; and again at 9 P.M., back at the Rec Center, as square dancers thronged the lobby and the children's basketball players pounded the courts upstairs.

That level of dedication from Mr. B, and his talented staff, gives residents of all ages in our Village the opportunity for good, clean, safe, healthy fun.

Transfer Station Open

The Village Transfer Station on Sunrise Highway adjacent to the Public Works building, is open to the public the first and third Saturdays of the month from 10 A.M. to 2 P.M. through November 15 to receive large items of trash, including furniture and appliances. Proof of residency is required.

S.T.O.P. Collections

The Town of Hempstead's Stop Throwing Out Pollutants program will hold hazardous waste collections from 8 A.M. to 3 P.M. on Sunday, October 19 at North Woodmere Park, Branch Boulevard in North Woodmere.

Town residents may bring hazardous or toxic household chemicals and products to the collection point for proper disposal at no charge.

Expanded Recycling Program

n addition to newspaper recycling, Village residents may now recycle virtually all clean paper and cardboard products — including food packaging— from the convenience of their curbside each Wednesday.

Because this program has the potential to reduce the cost of trash disposal by as much as 20 percent, Village officials are urging residents to think about

how much household waste could be diverted into the Wednesday recycling program.

In the kitchen:

Recycle all cardboard food and product packaging: cereal boxes, cookie and cracker boxes, dry food boxes, tissue boxes, other cardboard packaging.

Throw out all waxed, foiled and cellophaned packaging: cereal box liners, juice and beverage containers, chip and cookie bags, frozen food boxes and bags. Paper towels and tissues.

From the home office:

Recycle all photocopier and printer paper and wrappings; old files, letterhead and reports (even still stapled); used manila folders, binder dividers, index cards and envelopes (even windowed); writing paper, drawing paper, note paper. Telephone books. All shredded paper.

Throw out all adhesive labels, metal



fasteners, rubber bands, carbonized papers, cellophane.

From the mail:

Recycle all magazines, catalogs, brochures; junk mail envelopes and advertising.

Cardboard boxes and packaging may either be collapsed and tied into bundles or stuffed inside of larger boxes, paper bags or clear plastic bags.

All paper products may be placed inside paper bags, clear plastic bags or cardboard boxes and closed up before being placed at the curbside.

Residents may visit the Village website at www.rvcny.us/recycle/recycle.html to type in their address and have their sanitation schedule displayed. The link will show the day of the week for recycling glass, cans and plastics; the day for recycling newspapers, magazines, catalogs, paper products and cardboard; as well as the regular trash pick-up days.
