

Village Makes Two New Appointments

The Village of Rockville Centre has appointed Patrick O'Brien to Superintendent of Buildings, and Suzanne Sullivan as Community Development Director.

In his new role, O'Brien is responsible for the day-to-day operations of the Building Department. The Building Department inspects licensed work, conducts life safety inspections, investigates complaints of violations of the Village and New York State Code, and determines whether building permit applications may be granted or if they are required to be directed to the Planning Board for site plan review, special use permits, or subdivision review or to the Zoning Board for zoning code variance requests, as well as Exterior Design Review for those property owners improving and enhancing their respective homes and businesses.

"We welcome Patrick O'Brien to the Village of Rockville Centre and his years of experience in the building industry," commented Mayor Francis X. Murray. "Pat will play an integral role to ensure buildings are safe within the community and the Village remains a highly desirable community to live, work, and play."

Lifelong Rockville Centre resident, Patrick O'Brien previously served as Code Enforcement Officer for the Village of Cedarhurst. O'Brien has a vast history in the building industry including owning and operating a home improvement company, serving as Contract Coordinator for the



New York Transit Authority, and a Code Enforcement Officer for the Village of Hewlett Harbor. Committed to the Rockville Centre community, O'Brien has served on numerous boards and committees benefitting the community including the St. Agnes CYO Program, St. Agnes Fathers' Club, RVC Basketball League, RVC Community Fund Margaritaville, and a member of the Rockville Centre Planning Board.

Suzanne Sullivan, Rockville Centre native, was appointed as the Community Development Director at the February Board of Trustees meeting. In her new role, Suzanne will plan and administer the annual Community Development Block Grant, prepare grant proposals and contracts to secure funds and services for Village use, and support the efforts of residents, advisory groups, and community organizations access municipal government.

Suzanne has a degree from Manhattan College with majors in Politics and Government, as well as Urban Affairs. She was an Assistant Vice President at Donaldson, Lufkin and Jenrette and has worked with top companies including Merrill Lynch and Morgan Stanley. Suzanne has spent countless hours serving the Rockville Centre Community. Over the years she has served as a Trustee to the Village Board, a member of the Planning Board, St. Patrick's Parade Board of Directors, St. Agnes CYO Board, and the St. Agnes Mothers' Club. Suzanne also spends time teaching our youth as the co-head coach of the St Agnes Swim Team and a tennis coach at Sacred Heart Academy.

"Suzanne's knowledge of our Village and ability to work with residents and community organizations makes her the best person for the job," continued Mayor Murray.

Around Our Community

In a surprise presentation at the February 6th Board of Trustees meeting, the Village of Rockville Centre unveiled a street sign, Det. Steven McDonald Way, which has been placed next to the Village Police Station, at the corner of Madison and Maple avenues. The sign was presented to Detective McDonald's wife, Malverne Mayor Patti Ann McDonald, and son, NYPD Sgt. Conor McDonald, who were in attendance to thank the Village for its support during the difficult days after Steven suffered a heart attack and died on January 10th.

"Detective Steve McDonald, a Rockville Centre native, was shot 30 years ago while on duty in Central Park leaving him paralyzed," Mayor Francis X. Murray said at the presentation. "Defying all medical predictions, Steve lived for three decades after the shooting. He

never let his debilitating injury define him, he inspired us all to love, respect and most of all forgive. Turning tragedy into inspiration, Steve forgave the very young man who shot him."

Members of the St. Agnes Choir sang "America the Beautiful" and "God Bless America" for the crowded room including family, friends, and police officers.

"For every great hero you need a great heroine and this story has one," continued Mayor Murray. "Throughout it all, the ups and the downs, Steve had the love of his life by his side, Patti Ann. Her dreams and aspirations were dramatically changed when Steve was shot. Three months pregnant, Patti never gave up and her strength and character lifted and carried her family and all they would touch."



Village Rolls Out 2017 Road Program

In 2017, the Village of Rockville Centre will be repairing approximately 3 miles of roadway. Sites are selected based on a number of factors including pedestrian safety, pavement condition, and other utility upgrade needs such as water mains.

"Roads are a critical component of any community's transportation infrastructure," commented Mayor Francis X. Murray. "With 50 miles of roadway, the Village of Rockville Centre is committed to maintaining and improving Village roadways for residents and visitors."

The road construction process includes a number of stages. If road improvements are being done in your neighborhood, you

can expect to see the following typical process stages occur: surveying, water main upgrades, drainage upgrades, electrical lighting and infrastructure upgrades, new base and top asphalt, new stop bars, and new concrete curbs, pads, driveway ramps and handicap ramps. In addition, if there is a tree that will be impacted by the excavation or if the tree is deceased, it will be removed. Each roadway is expected to take three to five months depending on weather.

Phase Two of the 2016 road program has eight roadways that include parts of Princeton Road, Plymouth Road, Oxford Road, Stratford Road, Derby Road, Wellsley Road, Marlborough

Court, and Bramshott Court. Phase One of the 2017 roadway program is scheduled to begin in the early summer and is comprised of 14 roads including parts of Heyward Lane, Stonewell Road, Paddock Lane, Brouwer Lane, Midfarm Road, Virginia Avenue, Leon Court, Meehan Lane, Rockaway Avenue, Wilson Lane, Woodland Avenue, Holyoke Road, Hamilton Road, and Amherst Court. Phase two of the 2017 road program is scheduled to commence in the early fall and is comprised of eight roads including parts of Hughes Street, Combes Avenue, Kennedy Avenue, Bennett Street, South Village Avenue, Locust Avenue, Major Court, and Bleinheim Court. In addition to the road

repairs, the Village will provide a welcoming environment for visitors and commuters through its streetscape projects that will include Morris Avenue from Sunrise Highway to Maple Avenue and South Village Avenue from Lincoln Avenue to South Centre Avenue.

Unfortunately, this type of work will have impacts to residents during the construction period. However, we do strive to minimize impact as much as possible, and will make all efforts to provide advanced notice for planned access or service impacts.

The single polling place effects only for the odd-year Village elections, not the even-year general elections for county, state and federal offices.

Village Hall Comments by Trustee Michael Sepe



and when should it simply leave people to their own choices?

In the last few years, many well intentioned people in our Village have asked us to use our power in ways that range from sobering to alarming. For example, we've been asked to seize privately owned property by eminent domain to create public parking and to force the owners of older homes that certain people deemed historic, to sell to designated buyers, at half their value. We have also been urged to force residents renovating their homes to change their design choices to satisfy the tastes of others, to ban farmers markets, and to prohibit the use of basketball hoops on sidewalks. We've even discovered a section of our Village Code that would prohibit children from playing ball on our streets.

Whether on issues of taxes, residential and commercial restrictions, or spending, we are constantly dealing with the question

of 'how much is too much' and 'how far is too far' in extending the authority of Village Government into your lives.

The last six years have taught some eye opening lessons. First, realize that any Village regulation is, by definition, a restriction on your choices as someone who lives or runs a business here. Many are necessary and some are simply desirable. Second, in my own experience over the past six years is that one-size-fits-all solutions never work and you yet somehow always seem to have unintended consequences. These situations typically come as a result of requests to pass Village-wide restrictions out of a real concern for individual situations or projects. Whether the concern is rooftop bars, breeds of dogs, a particular home being built, or night parking revenue, we have seen well intentioned measures affect the lives of residents and businesses in unwanted

ways. In too many of these cases we have then been required to spend considerable time undoing the resulting problems. Third, our best legislative work has usually been the most narrowly focused. In that way we have used our powers to prohibit specific businesses like marijuana dispensaries and paraphernalia stores, hookah lounges and adult entertainment and added certain restrictions to our building code to protect residents. At the same time, we've eliminated certain outdated code provisions and streamlined Village procedures to make them faster and fairer for our residents.

Every issue we will deal with the years ahead will raise this question and only you will decide what the proper balance should be. I encourage residents to stay involved and take an interest in the affairs of local government. At the end of the day, it's these decisions that have the greatest impact your daily lives.

How Much Regulation Is Enough

Village government constantly struggles with the question of how far should we go in regulating the lives of our residents and businesses. It's a question we see our national leaders wrestling with and it is no different at the local level. When should the government step in and impose its authority



The RVCPD is comprised of 54 sworn officers and has a dynamic professional training program, logging more than 3,000 hours in disciplines such as emergency vehicle operations, drug and alcohol recognition, hazardous materials handling, use of force, active shooter response, narcotics enforcement and gang intelligence. Although criminal activity remains on a downward trend in the Village, the RVCPD remains vigilant and proactive.


