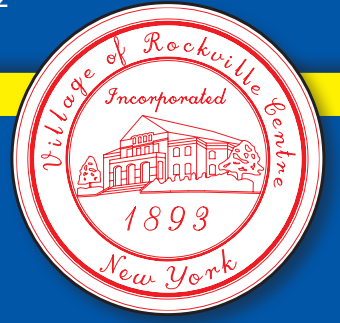

## Rockville Centre Awarded "Sense of Place"



The Village of Rockville Centre received the "Sense of Place" award on June 8th at the 2018 Smart Growth awards ceremony from Vision Long

Island. Celebrating 20 years of working to lay the ground work for architectural modernization in Nassau and Suffolk counties, Vision Long Island has promoted more livable, economically sustainable and environmentally responsible growth throughout Long Island through Smart Growth. The award recognized the Village's thriving downtown.

"I would like to thank Vision Long Island for recognizing Rockville Centre with this award," commented Mayor Francis X. Murray. "While it is a great honor to win the Sense of Place Award, I am sure it comes as no great shock to the residents of Rockville Centre. Our schools, recreation programs for our youth and seniors, safety, thriving downtown and overall quality of life is second to none. We will continue my administration's mission to keep Rockville Centre a desirable community to live, work and play for generations to come."

## Village Breaks Ground on Iron-Removal Plant

The Village officially broke ground on its Iron-Removal Treatment Plant located on Maple Avenue. The new plant will provide up to 5.6 million gallons of iron free water daily to Village residents. The second plant of its kind in the Village will take approximately a year to construct.

"The Village water supply is safe to drink and use. However, additional iron content can cause water discoloration, which this second filtration system will tackle," commented Mayor Francis X. Murray. "This iron removal plant will remove the naturally occurring iron from the water before it enters our distribution system."

The Rockville Centre Water Department provides water from 10 wells located throughout the Village. The water is stored in four elevated tanks with a combined capacity of 4 million gallons and is distributed through more than 70 miles of water main. The water quality is constantly monitored and tested to assure its purity. The iron-filtration system will use a sand and anthracite media to trap iron molecules as they pass through filter vessels.



## New Comptroller Appointed



The Village of Rockville Centre has appointed Dennis Morgan, CPA as the new comptroller. Morgan brings over two decades of experience in the accounting industry to Rockville Centre.

In his new role, Morgan is responsible for the preparation and implementation of the annual operating budget, for the sale of bonds to finance capital projects, and for advising the Board of Trustees about the general financial condition of the Village. In addition, Morgan will also supervise the Village's risk management and control systems, and will help implement a new enterprise-wide software system which will enhance the Village's ability to provide services in a cost-effective manner.

"We welcome Dennis Morgan and his vast experience to the Village of Rockville Centre," commented Mayor Francis X. Murray. "Dennis will play an integral role in

our Village's sound fiscal practices that have been recognized with the highest ratings from Moody's and Standard and Poor's."

Most recently, Morgan served as Chief Deputy Comptroller for the Town of North Hempstead and assisted the Comptroller's office to meet the Town's diverse accounting and compliance deadlines. Prior to his work at the Town of North Hempstead, he delivered strategic consultation and accounting operations services to various municipal, corporate, and healthcare organizations at his sole practice, Dennis M. Morgan, CPA.

"I am looking forward to working with Village to fulfill their commitment to being fiscally responsible and mindful of holding down taxes," stated Dennis Morgan. "I will work closely with department heads and Village leadership to uphold the prudent fiscal practices."

## Village Urges Water Safety this Summer



With the warm summer months upon us, the Village of Rockville Centre urges residents to practice water safety. According to the Centers for Disease Control, drowning is the leading cause of unintentional injury and death among children one to fourteen years old and fifth among all age groups.

"It is imperative that each household takes the proper safety measures to help prevent a water-related tragedy from occurring," commented Mayor Francis X. Murray. "Constant supervision, along with four-sided fencing, knowing how to perform CPR and teaching children how to swim are all important steps in preventing pool tragedies and promising for a fun and safe summer season."

The Village of Rockville Centre and New York State building codes include very specific rules and regulations regarding swimming pool and hot tub safety such as pool alarms and secure fencing to protect the safety of all our residents and guests. Residents can contact the Building Department at 678-9247 for a no cost evaluation to assure that all fencing, safety and electrical codes are met to assure your continued safety and enjoyment of your swimming pool. Below are some precautions to keep you and your family safe this summer in and around the pool:

- Never leave your children alone in or near the pool, even for a moment. Do not rely on older children to watch a younger child.
- Do not rely solely on safety aids such as water wings, arm bands or safety vests. Adult supervision is still necessary.
- Practice 'touch supervision' with children

younger than 5 years. This means that an adult is within an arm's length of the child at all times.

- Install an alarm in your pool.
- If you are planning a pool party, consider hiring a certified lifeguard to supervise those who will be in the pool.
- When entertaining have adults gather facing the pool, more eyes means better safety.
- Encourage swimming with a buddy, never swim alone.
- Put up a fence to separate your house from the pool. The fence should be at least 4 feet high around the pool. Use gates that self-close and self-latch, with latches higher than your children's reach.
- Keep rescue equipment (such as a shepherd's hook or life preserver) and a telephone by the pool.
- Do not use air-filled "swimming aids" as a substitute for approved life vests.
- Remove all toys from the pool after use so children aren't tempted to reach for them.
- After the children are done swimming, secure the pool so they can't get back into it.
- Drain Entrapment occurs when part of a child's body becomes attached to a drain because of the powerful suction of a pool or hot tub filtration system. The powerful suction can trap a child underwater or cause internal injuries. It can also occur when a child's hair, swimsuit or jewelry becomes entangled in the drain. Warn your children about the dangers of drain entrapment, and teach them never to play near a pool drain, with or without a cover.
- Pin up long hair when in the water and remove loose parts of swimsuits and loose jewelry that can get ensnared.
- Equip pools and hot tubs with an anti-entrapment drain cover and an approved safety vacuum release system and regularly check that drain covers are secure and have no cracks. Flat drain covers can be replaced with dome-shaped ones.
- Be aware of "kiddie" pools with missing or broken drain covers. Small children have direct access to the bottom drain in "kiddie" pools and sitting on open drains can cause serious internal organ damage.
- Learn CPR and first aid to prepare for emergencies.



### Lawn Sprinkling Hours

The Rockville Centre Board of Trustees has adopted a stringent water conservation plan, as mandated by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC). This plan includes universal water metering as well as mandatory fines for watering between the hours of 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. Watering of lawns must coincide with the house address for odd and even days.

### Community Day

The Annual Community Day will be held in front of the Martin Luther King, Jr. Community Center on Centre Ave. Saturday, August 26th from noon to 4 p.m. The day will include activities for children, music, dance performances, and tasty treats.

### Scam Alert

Please be advised that from time to time we are made aware of a variety of scams attempted against our residents and surrounding communities. In a recent nationwide scheme, scammer tells the parent or grandparent that their loved one has been kidnapped and demands a large sum of money over the phone in exchange for their family member's safe return. The scheme isn't new, but several police departments have recently received reports from concerned parents.

The Rockville Centre Police Department, in conjunction with other law enforcement agencies, continually seeks preventive measures to ensure the public is both safe and well informed. We encourage the community to immediately contact the police if they encounter any calls that require a ransom for kidnapping, traffic accidents, payment for bail or any other reason. ## Village Hall Comments by Trustee Emilio Grillo



As our Village was incorporated in 1893, our infrastructure is something that requires continued maintenance and upgrading over time. To ensure that our residents continue to enjoy a quality of life that is unique to Rockville Centre, as your Village Board, we remain vigilant in our efforts to upgrade our Village infrastructure on a regular basis. As the Board liaison to our Village Water Department, I would like to share some information with you regarding recent upgrades to our Village water system, as well as our future plans.

With the summer months upon us, with warmer temperatures, and residents spending significant time outdoors, our water usage naturally increases. Many residents may not be aware of that our Village Water Department processes over 5 million gallons of water per day, for our residential and business communities

during the summer months. In order to provide everyone with the safest and highest quality drinking water possible, the Village has recently commenced construction of a new iron filtration plant on Maple Avenue. This is the second iron filtration plant that is being constructed in our Village, and was made possible in part by the securing of a grant of \$953,121 in 2017, through the New York State Infrastructure Improvement Act. The new iron filtration plant, in conjunction with our current iron filtration system, will ensure that our village residents and businesses continue to receive the highest quality water supply possible.

As many residents may be aware, in conjunction with our roadway replacement program, our Village Board has replaced over 50,000 feet of water main in recent years, not only upgrading our roadway infrastructure but

more importantly upgrading the water supply to individual homes. Our job, however, is not done, as we will continue to replace and upgrade roadways, curbs and water mains throughout the Village in 2019. At present, plans are in place to replace an additional 7,000 feet of water mains as part of our infrastructure upgrade plans.

As your Village Board, please know that we are committed to maintaining and upgrading our Village infrastructure. As always, we welcome any input from our residents as we continue to seek ways to improve our Village, not only for our present residents, but for generations to come.

We wish all of our Village residents, a safe and happy summer, and please do not hesitate to contact me, or any Board member, if we can be of any assistance with any issue in our Village.

## Are You Ready for a Hurricane?

With hurricane season once again upon us, the Village of Rockville Centre cannot stress enough that all residents need to be prepared. The Atlantic hurricane season began on June 1st and lasts until November 30th. On average there are six hurricanes, three which are categorized as “major,” each year.

“History has taught us time and again just how dangerous and destructive hurricanes and other forces of nature can be,” commented Mayor Francis X. Murray. “I encourage all residents to be prepared by creating a family hurricane plan and assembling a hurricane supply kit. Being prepared is your best defense to safely weathering a storm, or any other disaster.”

According to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, forecasters are predicting a 70% likelihood of 10 to 16 named storms (winds of 39 mph or higher)

for the 2018 season. Of those, five to nine could become hurricanes (winds of 74 mph or higher), including one to four major hurricanes (Category 3, 4 or 5; winds of 111 mph or higher).

Creating an emergency plan ahead of time for you and your family will help you stay organized if a hurricane strikes. Your emergency plan should include a communication system, disaster supply kit, and an alternate meeting place if your home is unsafe. Depending on the severity of the hurricane, you may need to evacuate where you live. Flying debris from the excessive winds are often the deadly and destructive results of these weather events. Residents are encouraged to bring in all outdoor furniture, decorations, garbage cans and anything else that is not tied down. If you have construction activities underway, make sure the job site is secure

before the storm hits.

Major concerns during these natural disasters include downed power lines, which can cause extreme electrical hazards. In the event you lose power, residents can report a power outage, anytime, by calling 516-766- 5800. Please DO NOT go near any downed wires and always assume that any downed wire is a live electric wire. Do not approach or drive over a downed wire. If a wire falls on a vehicle, occupants should stay inside the vehicle until help arrives.

“I advise all residents to gather any important paperwork including insurance, birth certificates and other documents and keep them in a handy location,” continued Murray. “Rest assured that in any case of an emergency, we will be doing everything in our power to assist our residents.” Get alerted about emergencies and other



important community news by signing up for the Village’s Swift 911. This system enables the Village of Rockville Centre to provide residents with critical timely information in a variety of situations, such as severe weather. ## DEC Warns Residents to Watch Out for Oak Wilt

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation is asking people to be vigilant for Oak Wilt. Referred to as a heart attack for a tree, Oak Wilt is a fast-acting disease that can cause mortality in red oaks in as little as two weeks

Since the oak wilt fungus can dwell in firewood and can transmit its spores through nitidulid beetles, the disease can travel long distances. Symptoms of oak wilt primarily involve the discoloration of leaves, starting at the top of the leaf and moving its way down. The bronzing of the leaf is quite distinct, with a sharp line usually separating the discoloration with the healthy green color.

"Trees and green spaces are an

important part of Rockville Centre," commented Mayor Francis X. Murray. "While Oak Wilt has not been discovered here in the Village, help us preserve our community and trees by taking the time to learn the symptoms and monitor the trees in and around your property."

The disease restricts the flow of water and nutrients to the tree, thus causing it to wilt. While red oaks succumb quickly, white oaks have a stronger system to fight the infection. Infected white oaks can last anywhere from four to 12 years.

## TIME TO ORDER A TREE

The Rockville Centre Department of Public Works curbside tree planting program is now underway for the Fall of 2018. Residents have until September 15, 2018 to order a tree from among the seven varieties listed below. Trees are \$250.00 each. Village contractors will plant a tree for you for \$350.00, which includes the cost of the tree, planting and a one-year guarantee.
