

## Village Welcomes New Police Officers



Rockville Centre Police Commissioner James Vafeades swore in new Officers Ronald Flood, Robert Hugli, Philip Kouril, Christopher Martins, and Michelle Tetonic at the October Board of Trustees meeting. In addition, Detective Nicholas DeLuca was promoted to Sergeant.

"Police officers in our Village make significant sacrifices every day to ensure our safety and maintain our peaceful neighborhoods," commented Mayor Francis X. Murray. "I feel extremely confident that these officers will continue to keep our community a safe home to work, play, and raise a family."

Officer Ron Flood, a graduate of St. Joseph's College, earned a bachelor's degree in criminal justice and a minor in sociology. In 2015, Flood joined the NYPD and worked in the 81st precinct for three years before joining the Village of Rockville Centre. Officer Robert Hugli holds an associate's degree in liberal arts attained from Nassau Community College. Thereafter he attended SUNY Old Westbury where he obtained a bachelor's degree in communications, media and journalism. Hugli completed the NYC Police Academy in December of 2010 and during his eight-year run with the NYPD had over 170 arrests and was awarded several Cop of The Month recognitions. Officer Kouril, a graduate from Suffolk County Community College with an associate's in science degree

in criminal justice and a bachelor's in science degree in security management from John Jay College of Criminal Justice, has volunteered as a Firefighter and EMT and was awarded the Suffolk County lifesaving commendation. Kouril joined the New York City Police Department where he spent three years before transferring to the Rockville Centre Police Department. During his time in the NYPD's 81st precinct, he was awarded an Excellent Police Duty and a Meritorious Police Duty commendation. Officer Christopher Martins attended Nassau Community College and John Jay College studying criminal justice. Police Officer Martins began his police career with the New York City Police Department in 2010 and throughout his tenure received several awards, including a Commanders Day Award: Cop of the Month award five times: and the Excellent Police Duty Medal five times. Officer Michelle Tetonic earned her associate's degree in criminal justice at Suffolk County Community College. In July 2014. Tetonic started her career with NYPD. She was awarded Cop of the Month, Meritorious Police Duty medal, and Excellent Police Duty medal at the 103rd precinct. In October 2017. Michelle began work with the Suffolk County Police Department before joining the Village of Rockville Centre.

"Sergeant DeLuca has demonstrated his invaluable services to the Village. I commend him for his hard work on behalf of our residents and visitors and wish him all the best in his new position," continued Mayor Murray.

The 31st Annual Mayor's Golf Classic proved to be a success. The primary fundraiser for the RVC Community Fund raised over \$50,000. The Classic paid tribute to the RVC Lacrosse Club and the 2018 Eugene J. Murray Outstanding Citizenship Award recipient, Ellen White. As a community leader, entrepreneur, and mom, Ellen White is the creative force behind South Side High School's successful Centre Stage Program. It was through Ellen's experience with Centre Stage that BackYard Players & Friends (BYP & Friends) was born. Ellen co-founded BYP & Friends, an inclusive art-based program designed to enhance the social and interpersonal skills for teens and young adults. The program provides community enrichment programs in a loving and supportive environment. In addition, Ellen built an outdoor creative play space called "Mary's BackYard." This interactive play space includes elements of music, art, science, literature and theatre to create positive and meaningful experiences for the community at large. Ellen, whose

sons all played lacrosse, has also served as President of Rockville Centre Lacrosse and founded the girl's lacrosse program. Most recently, Ellen organized the Village StoryWalk, a self-directed learning opportunity that encouraged families to join with the community and walk together through a story by following a path of pages. Participants walked the story of "The Survivor Tree" by Cheryl Somers Aubin at the Village 9/11 Memorial and in front of the Callery Pear Tree that was seeded from the Survivor Tree and was given to the Village of Rockville Centre from the National September 11th Memorial & Museum at the their athletic ability and on a larger scale, learn teamwork, good sportsmanship and commitment. ## Mayor Murray Announces Free Parking on Saturdays in December to Promote Local Holiday Shopping

As the holiday shopping season gets underway, the Mayor, along with the Board of Trustees, would like to remind residents to shop local and promote our thriving downtown. In recognition of the importance of shopping local, the Mayor announced that parking will be free for patrons on Saturdays during the month of December and on Small Business Saturday on November 24th, a day dedicated to supporting local small businesses and strengthening and celebrating communities throughout the United States.

"There's no denying that small businesses are essential for a healthy local economy that sustains the unique character and quality of life that exists here in Rockville Centre," commented Mayor Francis X. Murray. "We are fortunate to have a thriving downtown with a variety of shops to meet every holiday shopping list."

In 2016, an estimated 112 million

consumers reported shopping at small businesses on Small Business Saturday, marking a 13 percent increase from 2015. According to the U.S. Small Business Administration, there are currently 28.8 million small businesses in the United States, representing 99.7 percent of all businesses with employees in the U.S., and they are responsible for 63 percent of new jobs created the past 20 years. Downtown Rockville Centre remains a diversified and vibrant business district. The Village is home to some one-of-a-kind specialty boutiques, yet there are choices to meet the needs of any family – home furnishings, sporting goods, clothes, florists, drug stores, gift shops, and a variety of other options. Preserve New York enables the Preservation League to support arts centers, historic sites, music halls, theaters, libraries and other cultural not-for-profit or municipal entities that steward historic buildings in every one of New York's 62 counties.

## Rockville Centre Wins Gold Award in AAA's Annual Traffic Safety Program



The Village of Rockville Centre has won a Gold Award in AAA Northeast's Community Traffic Safety Awards Program, as well as a Pedestrian Safety Citation.

The Village was cited for its many traffic safety efforts including strict enforcement of vehicle traffic violations, especially on the highvolume Sunrise Highway. The Village utilized vehicles equipped with RADAR and LIDAR units, deployed highly visible speed trailers and educated the public through the Department's web site. In addition, the Rockville Centre Police Department also performs child car seat inspections and bike safety programs, as well as educating the motoring public to promote a safer traffic flow. The Village also received a special citation for having four consecutive years with zero pedestrian fatalities.

The Village of Rockville Centre was honored during a luncheon ceremony held October 25th at the Garden City Hotel. AAA has long recognized communities that make outstanding efforts to make the region's roads safer for motorists, bicyclists, and pedestrians.



#### Tax Office Announcements

Real estate tax exemptions are available to volunteer firefighters with five years or more of certified service and to veterans based on the date and type of military service. The maximum assessed value that may be exempted varies with the status of the veteran claimant: non-combat and Cold War \$724; combat \$1206; and disabled up to \$2412 based on the percent of disability. Real estate tax exemptions are also available to disabled homeowners and to senior homeowners 65 and older with a 2017 gross income not exceeding \$37,400. All applications for partial exemption from Village real estate taxes must be filed by December 31, 2018. Applications are available on the Village website www.rvcny.gov, by visiting the Tax Office on the first floor of Village Hall at One College Place weekdays between 8:00 a.m. and 4 p.m. or by calling 516-678-9242. New property owners and those who have mortgages that have been satisfied, refinanced or sold to another lending institution are reminded to notify the Tax Office as soon as possible in order to avoid billing errors that may lead to penalties for late real estate tax payments.

These cans as well as any container with lids secured by bungee cords have been known to cause serious work related injuries to trash collectors. Always use the correct sized

garbage can, 36-gallons or less.

Oversized cans, like the one pictured above, were manufactured for collection by automated garbage trucks. Garbage trucks in the Village of Rockville Centre are loaded using manual labor.

#### Snow Reminders

In the event of a snowstorm, the Village urges residents not go out during or immediately after a snowstorm unless it is necessary. Crews will be able to do their job more quickly and completely if there is less traffic on the roads.

Residents and business owners are reminded that all sidewalks must be cleared within 24 hours after the end of a storm and snow should not be thrown into the roadway when clearing their driveways and sidewalks. If you have a fire hydrant along the curb-strip of your property, snow should be cleared so they may be located easily in case of an emergency.

To find out what your recycle day is for glass, cans and plastics, go to the Village website at: www.rvcny.us/recycle/recycle.html and enter your street address.

Collections will be made from the curb in front of all houses in accordance with the following regulations:

#### TIMES and PLACEMENT

Solid waste and bulk items must be placed on the curbstrip (not the roadway) no later than 7:30 A.M. on collection days. Items may be placed on the curbstrip the evening before pick-up. Materials put out late for collection will not be picked up. Empty containers must be removed from the curb area as soon as possible after pick-up and no later than 6 P.M.

#### **CONTAINERS**

Solid waste should be placed in metal or plastic containers with handles, non-attached covers, and with no holes or rips; or in sealed black plastic bags; or in sealed moisture-proof paper bags. Maximum size of containers should be 36 gallons.

#### SOLID WASTE

**Includes:** food waste; soiled or otherwise unrecyclable paper products; waxed cartons and packages, such as those used for beverages and frozen foods; plastic toys, utensils and tableware; discarded clothing. **Empty dried out water based paint cans should be placed next to garbage pails (only water based paint).** 

Does NOT include: broken glass; concrete; construction debris; propane tanks; hazardous materials (paints, solvents, rechargeable batteries, batteries, which may be disposed of through the Town of Hempstead's S.T.O.P. program – call 378-2200.

#### **BULK ITEMS**

Call 678-9288 before Noon on Tuesday for Wednesday pick-up of waste items too large for insertion into trash containers: branches and wood debris in bundles no more than 4 feet in length and weighing no more than 50 pounds; furniture; mattresses wrapped in plastic; rugs; household appliances (dishwashers, refrigerators (with doors off), stoves).

#### **RECYCLABLES – Glass, Cans, Plastics - Collection Day Depends on Area**

Glass, metal and plastic containers should be rinsed out and placed in a blue Rockville Centre recycling bin, a designated container with an RVC recycling sticker attached, or in a clear plastic bag. Replacement bins or stickers can be picked up at 10 Sunrise Highway, Monday through Friday between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. Please bring your license to show proof of residency. **Includes:** all plastic supermarket food containers (catsup, mayonnaise); plastic deli and take-out containers; all plastic beverage containers (water, milk, juice); and plastic containers for detergents and other cleaning products. **Does NOT include:** other types of plastic, such as those used in toys, utensils and tableware, which will contaminate the recycling stream and should be discarded as regular trash.

#### **RECYCLABLES – Paper Products - Collection Wednesdays**

**Includes:** newspapers; magazines; brochures and catalogs (including glossy catalogs); telephone books; cardboard boxes and **cardboard packaging with styrofoam removed**, gift boxes and food packaging (with any waxed or plastic paper inserts removed); photocopy and printer paper and packaging; writing paper, drawing paper, note paper, wrapping paper; junk mail postcards and envelopes (including windowed envelopes); index cards; manila folders, binder dividers; old files and reports; computer printouts; and register tapes. Stapled paper can be recycled; remove all other fasteners. Shredded paper should be placed in paper bags or clear plastic bags. All recyclable paper may be tied into bundles, collected inside cardboard boxes whose flaps can be closed, or put into paper bags or clear plastic bags.

**Does NOT include:** carbon paper and self-carbonized paper; typewriter ribbons; cellophane, sticky tapes and adhesive labels; rubber bands and metal fasteners and clips; facial tissue and paper towels; food wrappers, foil wrappers, waxed cartons and packages, such as those used for beverages and some frozen foods.

#### **E-CYCLING**

Includes: computers, computer monitors or anything that plugs into a computer, televisions, small electronics, vcrs, dvds, iPads, gps, video systems, cable boxes, small servers, cameras or video cameras, any type of telephones and calculators. Please bring your TVs and electronics to 10 Sunrise Highway between the hours of 10am and 2pm on the First Saturday of every month.

#### **SPECIAL ITEMS**

The following items should be separately contained and the containers prominently marked: broken glass, sharp instruments.

#### DISCARDED MEDICAL SUPPLIES (DO NOT DISCARD USED NEEDLES IN HOUSEHOLD REFUSE)

Used medical needles must be discarded at any local hospital, nursing home or The Department of Health.

#### **EXCLUDED ITEMS**

Rockville Centre will not accept contractor or medical waste, ammunition, explosives, propane tanks, broken concrete, or unlabeled materials.

#### HAZARDOUS MATERIALS

Call the Town of Hempstead's STOP program at (516) 378-2200 for monthly drop-off locations for hazardous or toxic household chemicals and products such as oil-based paints, solvents, varnish, waste oil, antifreeze, batteries, fluorescent bulbs, car tires (off the rim), photography and pool chemicals.

## Help Us Help You


• If snow is expected, move your cars into the driveway. Parking on the streets during a snow-storm is prohibited.

• If you are shoveling out the entrance of the driveway, never throw snow directly into the street. Shovel onto the curb-strip or other areas of your property. Shovel the snow to the right of your driveway.

• Do not plow snow into the street. Face the plow towards your lawn. Throwing snow back into the street creates hazardous driving conditions.

• If you have to go out during hazardous driving conditions, please remember to drive slowly, brake slowly, allow plenty of room between you and the vehicle in front of you and watch for sudden obstruction.

• Give yourself extra time to travel.




Please do not go out during or immediately after a snowstorm unless it is necessary. The crews will be able to do their job more quickly and completely if there is less traffic on the roads.

Residents and business owners are reminded that all sidewalks must be cleared within 24 hours after the end of a storm.

Residents should not throw snow into the roadway when clearing their driveways and sidewalks.

## **Rockville Centre Recycling Guide**

#### PAPER DAY

(Pick Up on Wednesday) <u>PAPER:</u> White paper, junk mail without plastic window, clean scrap paper, shredded paper, unsoiled newspapers, penny savers and magazines. **Tie into bundles no more than 12 inches high or put in PAPER grocery bags** 

<u>CARDBOARD</u>: Corrugated cardboard boxes, shoe boxes, gift boxes, shipping boxes (Amazon, UPS). **Flatten and tie into bundles no longer than 4 feet** 

#### **RECYCLING DAY**

(Pick Up on Your Designated Day) <u>PLASTIC/METAL/GLASS:</u> Food, beverage cans, plastic food & beverage containers, unsoiled disposable aluminum pans

& aluminum foil, wine, beverage, liquor and juice bottles, food jars, shampoo and detergent bottles. **Rinse plastic, glass and metal recyclables clean. Put into any rigid container, or bin, and place at the curb on the days indicated by your designated recycling day.**

#### S.T.O.P. (Stop Throwing Out Pollutants) Collections

The Town of Hempstead's Stop Throwing Out Pollutants program holds hazardous waste collections from 8A.M,

to 3P.M. once a month in various locations in the Town. Village of Rockville Centre residents may utilize this service by bring in hazardous or toxic household chemicals and products to the collection point for proper disposal at no charge.

Items ACCEPTED by the program: paints, solvents, varnish, waste oil, antifreeze, batteries, fluorescent light bulbs, car tires (off the rim), and photography and pool chemicals.

Items NOT accepted by the program: commercial or medical waste, ammunition, explosives, propane tanks <u>over</u> 20 pounds, or unlabled materials.
