Village of Rockville Centre Hosts Rally for More State Aid

The New York State Conference of Mayors and Municipal Officials (NYCOM), representing cities and villages across the Empire State, kicked off its statewide tour with a rally on the steps of Village Hall in Rockville Centre. The statewide campaign is urging the Governor and the State Legislature to increase unrestricted aid to cities and villages for the first time in 15 years. The tour will also tout other key legislative priorities related to municipal infrastructure and community redevelopment.

The rally and tour's primary focus highlights the impact that Aid Incentives Municipalities (AIM) funding has on the state's cities and villages. This funding, set at \$715 million, has not increased in 15 years — directly affecting the ability of local governments to respond to the growing demands on public safety and other essential municipal services.

Village of Rockville Mayor Centre immediate past president NYCOM, Francis X. Murray, said "AIM funding has remained at a standstill for nearly 15 years and yet the purchasing power the aid we receive gets smaller and smaller. We will continue to stand together and demand that the state delivers more AIM funding."

Mayor Francis X. Murray was joined by NYCOM President and Albany Mayor Kathy M. Sheehan, NYCOM Executive Director Barbara Van Epps, Trustee Emilio Grillo, and more that 20 government officials from across Long Island.

"As the collective voice for New York's cities and villages, this tour will showcase and highlight the very real challenges our members deal with daily because of the lack of additional unrestricted state aid," said Barbara J. Van Epps, NYCOM executive director. "Mayors share the same goals as our state leaders — to keep our communities safe and affordable — but we can't do that on our own. We need an ongoing commitment from the state to be a partner in our efforts to break down the barriers to

our residents," said Albany Mayor Kathy Sheehan, who serves as NYCOM President. "Cities and villages, whether it's a village like Rockville Centre or a city like Albany, deliver for our residents every day, and securing additional state aid will expand our efforts to enhance public safety and invest in our aging infrastructure."

Sheehan added that while the amount taxpayers have given to the state has increased every year, the aid given back to its communities has shrunk.

"We're thrilled to have kicked off this tour in Rockville Centre. I am eager to visit various parts of our state in order to drive home to our governor and the state legislature that increasing AIM funding is vitally important to our cities and villages, and ultimately "This is your money that is sitting in New York state's capital, and we want it back," Sheehan said. "We want it for our communities. We want it to be able to do good."

2024 Spring Hydrant Flushing

The Water Department will be conducting routine hydrant flushing starting Wednesday, April 10th and end on Tuesday, April 16th. Hydrant flushing is vital for the general maintenance of the Village's water services and is performed twice a year – once in the spring and once in the fall. It ensures performance of fire hydrants for firefighting purposes, and quality water for residents and businesses.

While the flushing program is underway, customers may experience a slight drop in water pressure or temporary water discoloration. Although this water is perfectly safe to drink, it may stain laundry. Customers should refrain from doing laundry while the flushing program is underway. If tap water is discolored, it is recommended to run cold-water faucets for a short time until the water runs clear. Using more than one faucet allows the water to clear faster.

- Friday, April 12th between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m.
 Area of the Village lying between Sunrise Highway and DeMott Avenue east of Long Beach Road.
- Sunday, April 14th to Monday, April 15th between 12 a.m. to 8 a.m. The entire area of the Village lying between Lakeview Avenue and

Merrick Road.

• Tuesday, April 16th between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m.
The entire area of the Village south of Merrick Road.

Village Recognizes South Side Student

The Village of Rockville Centre recognized South Side High School junior, Ella Burbige, at the February Board of Trustees meeting for her commitment to save lives.

After a friend suffered a cardiac arrest during basketball drills, coaches and trainers sprang into action and performed CPR and used an Automated External Defibrillator (AED). This near



tragedy inspired Ella to create the Heart and Sole Foundation, a student run non-profit that provides training and equipment necessary to save lives.

To date, Ella has provided two free EKG screenings for student athletes at SSHS and for St. Agnes CYO. Ella has also purchased an AED for Rockville Centre Schools and is donating a trainer AED to St Agnes CYO. Most recently, Ella donated \$1200 to both the John A. Anderson Recreation Center and the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Community Center for the purchase of an AED device to be housed on each site.



RVC Conservancy Offers 7th Annual Tree Planting Program

The RVC Conservancy has launched its 7th Annual Tree Planting Program for 2024. Since 2018, the RVC Conservancy has helped plant nearly 300 new trees in the Village and is looking to add more.

The Conservancy has partnered with Barbato Landscaping to provide trees that are mostly native to Long Island and can be planted in front yards or curb strips. This year, the program is offering Kentucky Coffee, Red Maple, Lilac, Pin Oak, Linden, and Sargent Cherry. Pricing is \$370 per tree and includes planting with a 1 -year replacement guarantee.
