Village of Rockville Centre Swears in New Police Commissioner and Promoted Officers

Randy Dodd, a seasoned law enforcement professional with 25 years of dedicated service in the Village of Rockville Centre, was sworn in as the new Rockville Department Centre Police Commissioner by Mayor Francis X. Murray on August 7, 2023. Additionally, Nick DeLuca was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant, and Officers Salju Thomas and Joseph Burnside were promoted to Sergeant at the same Board of Trustees meeting.

Born and raised in Long Beach

and Lido Beach with strong ties to Rockville Centre, Commissioner Dodd graduated from Long Beach High School with a full athletic scholarship to Northeastern University where he graduated with a Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice. Commissioner Dodd went on to receive a Criminal Justice Education Certificate from the University of Virginia. He joined Rockville Centre Police Department in 1997 and has been recognized as "Cop of The Year" and "Cop of the Month" multiple times. Commissioner Dodd was promoted to Traffic Sergeant in 2010 then Police Lieutenant Commanding Officer Patrol Division in 2021 where he managed daily operations in compliance with department policies and procedures. He collaborated with law enforcement agencies and community organizations to enhance public safety. Commissioner Dodd graduated the prestigious FBI National Academy this past June. In his new role, Commissioner Dodd will be responsible for planning, organizing, supervising and directing the activities of all 58 officers and 36 civilian employees in the department.



"I have full confidence that Commissioner Dodd is the right person for this important position," commented Mayor Francis X. Murray. "His years of expertise and experience will help continue the strong relationship between our community and Police Officers, as well as keep Rockville Centre one of the safest communities in New York."

Lieutenant Nick DeLuca graduated from he Westchester Police Academy at the top of his class in 2011, where he earned the highest award, "Best All Around Recruit." In 2014, DeLuca was selected to be the RVCPD's Youth Officer to work closely with the Youth Council and was later promoted to Detective, heading up the Juvenile Crimes Division in 2016. He was then promoted to Sergeant in September of 2018 where he supervised the Juvenile and Anti-Crime Divisions, supported the Patrol Division, and served as the departments Operations Sergeant. Outside of his commitment to his role as the Operations Sergeant, he also assists in the Training Department and built and manages the police website. Lieutenant DeLuca is a DCJS certified instructor, an FBI firearms instructor, Active Shooter Instructor, Taser Instructor, Defensive Tactics Instructor, and Network Engineer. He currently serves as the Vice President of the State of N.Y. Police



Juvenile Officers Association and is slated to become the President this year.

Sergeant Salju Thomas was born in India and immigrated to the United States in 1985. As a first-generation immigrant, he felt the call for service and enlisted in the United States Marine Corps after high school. He served honorably for the next ten years with multiple deployments including to Iraq in 2004 and 2005. He was honorably discharged in 2008 and attended Hofstra University. He graduated with honors in 2010 with a Bachelor of Arts in Public Relations. He joined the Rockville Centre Police Department in 2014 and has



been awarded numerous commendations including a plain bar for stopping a violent assault in progress. Sergeant Thomas is also a volunteer fire fighter with the Garden City Park Fire Department where he served as Chief of Department in 2020.

Sergeant Joseph Burnside, a Rockville Centre native, obtained a bachelor's degree of Biological Science from the University at Albany. Officer Burnside comes from a long line of law enforcement including his father Joseph Burnside who worked in Queens Robbery Task Force, Grandfather Joseph Burnside who was a Detective in the 71st Precinct, Grandfather Dennis Cunningham who served as an Inspector in Special Operations, and Aunt Majorie who worked in the Queens Robbery Task force. Before coming to Rockville Centre, Officer Burnside worked for the NYPD in the 83rd precinct in Bushwick. Sergeant Burnside has proven to be an asset since he was sworn in as a Police Officer in Rockville Centre in May 2017. In March 2021, Burnside received a commendation for a foot pursuit leading to the

arrest of three individuals for burglary.



Officer Palmer was also recognized as "Cop of the Year" for her heroic actions from the tanker accident that occurred on February 16, 2022, at North Centre Avenue and Sunrise Highway. The tanker, carrying approximately 9,200 gallons of gasoline, overturned and crashed into the vacant La-Z-Boy and then skidded into the parking lot of Bargain Liquors. Officer Palmer quickly responded to the location, located the operator of the truck, who had just climbed out of the engulfed vehicle, and with the assistance of Officer Robinson, dragged the operator approximately 1/2 block away, in order to render medical aid, all while risking severe injury from the fully engulfed tanker. We thank Officer Palmer for her swift actions and diligence that night and her dedication to the RVCPD.

"Lieutenant DeLuca, Sergeant Thomas, Sergeant Burnside, and Officer Palmer are exemplary members of the Rockville Centre Police Department and truly earned this honor," added Mayor Murray. "I am immensely proud and grateful of them and our entire Police Department for their commitment to protecting our great Village."

Tax Office Announcements

Real estate tax exemptions are available to volunteer firefighters with certified service and to veterans based on the date and type of military service. The maximum assessed value that may be exempted varies with the status of the veteran claimant: non-combat and Cold War \$535; combat \$891; and disabled up to \$1,782 based on the percent of disability. Real estate tax exemptions are also available to disabled homeowners and to senior homeowners 65 and older with a 2022 gross income not exceeding \$58,399. Applications are available on the Village website www.rvcny.gov on the Tax Office page, by emailing taxoffice@rvcny.us or by calling the Tax Office Monday to Friday, 8am - 4pm at (516) 678-9242. The filing deadline for all 2024/25 exemption applications is January 2, 2024. New property owners and those who have satisfied, refinanced or sold their mortgage to another lending institution should contact the Tax Office as soon as possible either by email at taxoffice@rvcny.us or telephone at (516) 678-9242 in order to avoid billing errors that may lead to penalties for late real estate tax payments.

Viewpoint: Comments by Trustee Emilio F. Grillo **Powering Future Generations to Come**

As one of only three (3) municipalities on Long Island with its own electric power plant, the Village of Rockville Centre is able to provide our residents and local businesses with cost efficient and continuous electrical service throughout the year. In order to do so, our Village Board works on a regular basis with our Superintendent of Electric, Mrs. Eileen Foglietta, and her team of dedicated employees. We work together to ensure that our Village electrical infrastructure is not only maintained, but also upgraded to keep up with customer demand and service.

Most recently, old circuit breakers have started to be replaced within Substation 1 & 2 at the Village Power Plant, located a 110 Maple Avenue, as well as a new control system

has been designed for Engine 14 to be installed this upcoming winter. In addition to system upgrades, which will provide more efficient service, additional technology upgrades have been implemented to gather data and improve communication between all areas of the Village's electrical distribution network. This will help identify the source of an

outage, which is critical indicators are being added to cables in the

field, and new controls are being installed in the electrical substations and the Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) system will be upgraded in spring 2024. These upgrades will be utilized by our electrical operators for monitoring our system and to ensure power outages are limited and restored as quickly and efficiently as possible. In addition to

updates to the electrical to reducing repair time. For example, fault system, our distribution infrastructure, such as manholes, are also being repaired and overhead

wires replaced as necessary, to minimize future outages.

As a Village Board, we remain vigilant in finding ways to upgrade our current electrical system and to find ways to secure sustainable energy for years to come. By continuing to work with Mrs. Foglietta and our Electric Department staff, we continue to upgrade and/or replace antiquated technology such as primary boxes, 2-phase distribution and analog meters with newer technologies that improve the reliability and resiliency of the distribution system.

These continuous upgrades will not only provide more efficient and cost-effective electrical service to our current residents and businesses, but also for many future generations to come.

As our children have returned to the classrooms, all motorists are reminded to take extra precautions to keep our youngest commuters safe when they are traveling to and from school. Schools return means more buses picking up and dropping off students, more people walking and bicycling to and from school, and more congestion which means an increase for potential hazards.

'Our young students going to and from school are among our most vulnerable road users," commented Mayor Francis X. Murray. "Drivers must be alert and use caution, stop for pedestrians, obey traffic signs, and slow down. Cut out all distractions, including texting and talking on cell phones. Please follow the rules of the road to ensure everyone, especially our children, make it home safely."

Speed limits around our schools are 20 miles per hour, whether motorists are on a side street or a main road. In addition, all drivers moving in either direction must stop for a stopped school bus, which is picking up or dropping off children. Motorists must remain stopped until all children are clear of the roadway and the bus stop arm is withdrawn. The Village and the schools partnered in September, as they do every year, to provide a bicycle safety course for elementary school students.
