The Rockville Centre Police Department added three new officers to the rank and file. At the January Board of Trustees meeting, Officer James Garrity, Officer Eric Hochhauser, and Officer Michael Guerrini were sworn into their new posts.

"The safety of our residents, businesses, visitors, and their property remains the top priority of my administration," commented Mayor Francis X. Murray. "I welcome the addition of these three highly trained Officers to the RVCPD. We are fortunate to have dedicated officers who are committed to keeping Rockville Centre one of the safest



communities in New York."

Officer James Garrity was born and raised in Bellerose, NY. He attended Chaminade High School, then went on to Manhattan College where he received a bachelor's degree in business management. Officer Garrity brings with him over 10 years of experience and training from the NYPD. Officer Garrity considers his best accomplishment in the NYPD as meeting his wife who currently is a detective in the Special Victims Unit. Officer Garrity is extremely excited to begin his new journey with us and looks forward to working and serving the community of Rockville Centre!

A Long Island native, Officer Eric Hochhauser was born and raised in Bellmore. He joined the NYPD in 2015 and began his law enforcement career as a Patrol Officer in the 26th precinct in Harlem. He was selected for the plain-clothes anti-crime unit, whose mission was to reduce violent crimes and conditions within the community. Within the 26th precinct, he was promoted to detective



and subsequently transferred to the 113th detective squad where he continued his investigative career until joining RVCPD.

Officer Michael Guerrini began his career in law enforcement as a Correction Officer on Riker's Island. He also spent the last six years in the NYPD in the 100th precinct. Prior to coming to the Rockville Centre Police Department, Officer Guerrini was most recently assigned to the Domestic Violence unit where he focused on the aid of Domestic Violence victims and enforcement on offenders.

Snow Reminders

In the event of a snowstorm, the Village urges residents not to go out during or immediately after a snowstorm unless it is necessary. Crews will be able to do their job more quickly and completely if there is less traffic on the roads. Residents and business owners are reminded that all sidewalks must be cleared within 24 hours after the end of a storm and snow should not be thrown into the roadway when clearing their driveways and sidewalks. If you have a fire hydrant on your property, snow should be cleared so they may be located easily in case of an emergency. Corner properties are responsible for clearing to the corner and curb cut access to allow pedestrian access to sidewalks.
